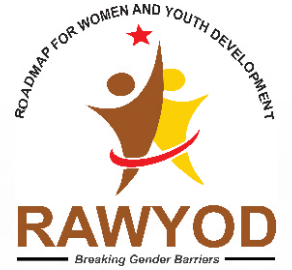

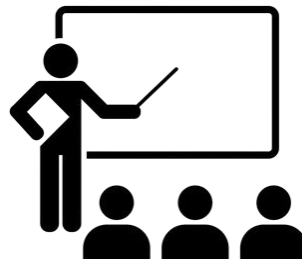

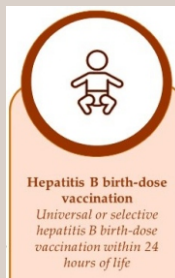

CODSAIN Project

Community-Oriented DMPA-SC/Self-Injection Acceleration in Nigeria (CODSAiN) Project is a program of Roadmap for Women and Youth Development (RAWYOD) with support from Association for reproductive and family health (ARFH) is implemented in Yobe State, funded by the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation (BMGF). The project aims to increase access to Hard to Reach (HTR) communities through its community-based distribution model to expand the acceptability and accessibility and close the gaps in the unmet needs and missed opportunities for FP through community scale-up of DMPA-SC and self-injection (SI) as a self-care measure within the broader contraceptive method mix. In 2024, the CODSAiN project made significant progress in enhancing family planning and maternal health services in Yobe State. Key achievements include:

1. **Increased Self-Injection Adoption:** A notable achievement was the steady increase in the number of women independently administering DMPA-SC/SI injections, providing them with greater autonomy in their family planning choices a notable increased raising from 7,707 General family planning uptake and 43 uptakes of Self-injection as at February, 2022 to 18,053 general family planning uptake and 1,834 Self-injections in December 2024.
2. **Improved Family Planning Dataset:** The project successfully expanded the Yobe State family planning dataset, incorporating previously excluded facilities into the DHIS 2 system. This initiative resulted in a 7% increase in the state's family planning dataset.
3. **Enhanced Supportive Supervision and Training:** Prioritizing supportive supervision and on-the-job training for service providers across 17 LGAs led to a 10% increase in new family planning acceptors and a 19.35% improvement in the uptake of DMPA-SC self-injection services.
4. **Expanded Access to Health Services:** The CODSAiN project improved access to maternal, newborn, and child health services, particularly through integrated outreach programs targeting remote and hard-to-reach communities in Yobe State.
5. **Increased Family Planning Uptake:** A comprehensive demand creation strategy has triggered the number of new family planning acceptors surged from 2,546 in January 2024 to 6,150 by November 2024. This growth was driven by sustained community engagement, outreach efforts, and sensitization campaigns.

AGREE Project

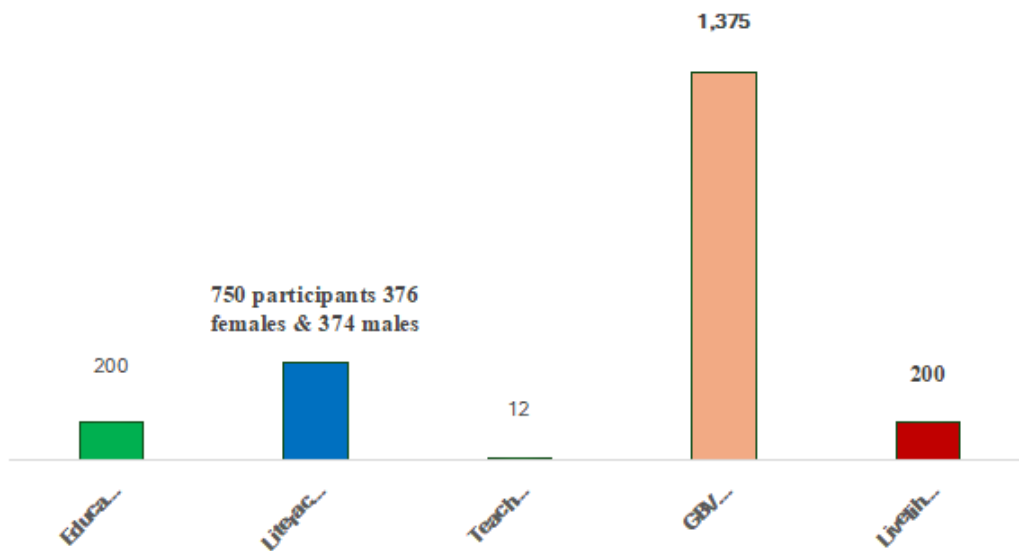
The Adolescent Girls Read, Engaged, and Empowered (AGREE) Project, launched in 2024, is a transformative initiative aimed at empowering marginalized adolescent girls aged 10-18 in Yobe State, Nigeria. The project, implemented in partnership with Unique Care and Support Foundation (CASFOD) and RAWYOD, focuses on education, skills development, gender-based violence (GBV) awareness, and livelihoods support. By creating safe spaces in schools and communities in Gujba and Damaturu Local Government Areas, AGREE seeks to improve educational outcomes, raise awareness on GBV, promote economic independence, and encourage active participation in school life. The project, running from July 2024 to March 2025, aims to equip adolescent girls with the skills and knowledge needed for a brighter, more independent future. Below are 2024 key achievements;

1. Educational Improvement: Over 200 learners were identified through a comprehensive school assessment and received targeted support via the Nigeria Learning Passport, significantly enhancing their academic performance and boosting their confidence.
2. Economic Empowerment: 100 Adolescent girls received training in local cap-making, 73 adolescent girls & 58 women were trained on charcoal briquette production, 82 adolescent girls & 107 women were trained and given seedlings for backyard farming, leading to increased household income and improved economic resilience within their communities.
3. Gender-Based Violence (GBV) Awareness: Community members were equipped with essential knowledge on preventing, identifying, and reporting GBV, as well as accessing support mechanisms, thereby promoting safer and more supportive environments.
4. Community Engagement: Active participation from parents, caregivers, and schools was secured, ensuring a strong collaborative approach in the implementation of project activities and fostering a supportive network for the adolescent girls.

2024 RAWYOD KEY ACHIEVEMENTS

- Literacy and Digital Skills Development:** 750 individuals (376 females, 374 males). were trained on computer literacy , acquired foundational digital literacy and skills, empowering them to engage with the digital world and enhancing their educational and professional prospects.
- Teacher Development:** A total of 12 teachers 8 Male & 4 females were trained on the Nigeria Learning Passport, improving their ability to integrate digital tools into their teaching, thereby enhancing access to education for students.
- GBV Awareness and Prevention:** 1,375 (668 caregivers & 707 Adolescent Girls) were sensitized on GBV prevention, reporting, and support, contributing to the creation of safer, more resilient communities.

HEPB BD Project

The Increasing Access to HepB BD in Yobe State, Nigeria project is implemented by RAWYOD in partnership with the Yobe State Ministry of Health, with funding from the Coalition for Global Hepatitis Elimination and the US CDC. The project focuses on addressing the high prevalence of Hepatitis B Virus (HBV) in the LGAs of Damaturu, Potiskum, and Bade within Yobe State. It targets pregnant women, women of childbearing age, healthcare workers, and key stakeholders, including community and religious leaders, government officials, and community-based organizations.

A cornerstone of the project is the training of healthcare workers, especially birth attendants, on the enhanced HepB-BD vaccination through a phased approach, which includes the training of master trainers followed by cascade training at health facilities. This approach not only enhances healthcare capacity but also fosters a collaborative network for knowledge exchange. The project also promotes widespread community awareness through radio jingles in local languages, distribution of Information, Education, and Communication (IEC) materials, face-to-face awareness sessions, and social media campaigns. Advocacy efforts focus on policy enhancement to ensure timely HepB-BD administration within 24 hours of birth, and include town-hall meetings and community dialogues to address barriers and promote policy revisions. Additionally, the project commemorates World HBV Day to raise awareness and generate support from both stakeholders and the government.

Key Project Achievements:

During the period of the project, the following successes were achieved:

- Strengthened knowledge and awareness on the importance of HepB BD within 24 hours of birth, particularly in the project implementation communities. The project reached 125 healthcare workers through training and awareness-raising initiatives.
- Increased access and availability of HepB BD across public and private health facilities, particularly in the implementing communities of Damaturu, Potiskum, and Bade LGAs. With the support of the project, over 13,000 newborns received HepB BD.
- Improved coordination mechanisms for Hepatitis elimination activities in Yobe State. To ensure project sustainability, the project reactivated the Viral Hepatitis Technical Working Group, ensuring full participation of key stakeholders, including government partners.
- Increased service/consumption ratio for HepB BD across the LGAs of project implementation.

CLM Project

The Community-Led Monitoring (CLM) Project on Malaria, Tuberculosis (TB), and HIV, being implemented in Jakusko LGA, Yobe State, is a comprehensive initiative aimed at enhancing the quality of healthcare services for malaria, TB, and HIV treatment through real-time, objective monitoring data. Running from April 2024 to December 2026, and funded by the Global Fund through ACOMIN and CRS, the project seeks to improve the availability and accessibility of essential healthcare services, reduce the wastage of resources, and advocate for increased funding for malaria interventions. By empowering local communities to actively monitor and report on health services, the project fosters accountability, drives improvements in service delivery, and ensures that critical health interventions effectively reach those most in need. Through these efforts, the CLM project aims to create sustainable, community-driven solutions that enhance healthcare outcomes for malaria, TB, and HIV in Yobe State.

Key Project Achievements:

- **Advocacy and Facility Repairs:** Through strategic advocacy, the project highlighted the deteriorating condition of the healthcare facility, including damaged walls, which led to a community member donating materials for repairs. These improvements have significantly enhanced the clinic's structural integrity, ensuring a safer environment for both patients and staff.
- **Provision of Essential Equipment:** Recognizing the need for better patient accommodation, the PHC Director of Jakusko LGA, Yobe State provided a new bed, while a community member donated mats to improve comfort for waiting patients and those in need of additional rest.
- **Increased Awareness and Demand for Services:** Community sensitization campaigns have significantly raised awareness of malaria, TB, and HIV, driving increased demand for testing and treatment services as individuals take proactive steps to protect their health.
- **Strengthened Monitoring and Accountability:** Through supportive supervision visits and facility baseline assessments, gaps such as shortages in malaria testing tools and data reporting inconsistencies were identified. Advocacy with local stakeholders has resulted in improved data management and prioritized access to essential resources and medications.

2024 RAWYOD KEY ACHIEVEMENTS

INTEGRATED NUTRITION AND CHILD HEALTH CAMPAIGN PROJECT

The Comm Care Connect Child Health Campaign focuses on improving child health outcomes through the delivery of essential health interventions, including Vitamin A supplementation, deworming tablets, screening and referral for malnutrition, and the option to incorporate additional impactful and localized interventions, such as Oral Rehydration Salts (ORS), Zinc supplementation, and nutrition advice via chatbots. This initiative empowers Frontline Workers (FLWs) and local organizations to engage in the delivery of these critical child health services through an application provided by Dimagi (CommCare). FLWs are compensated for the verified delivery of interventions within their communities. In collaboration with Dimagi, RAWYOD has successfully reached 3,000 children in Madagali Local Government Area (LGA) of Adamawa State, providing them with vital health commodities, including Zinc and ORS, to improve child health and combat malnutrition.

Key Achievements:

- Effective Training Sessions:** Successfully trained 17 frontline workers (FLWs), community committee members, and health workers at Central Primary School in Gulak, Adamawa State. The training focused on project implementation, with 4 females and 13 males in attendance.

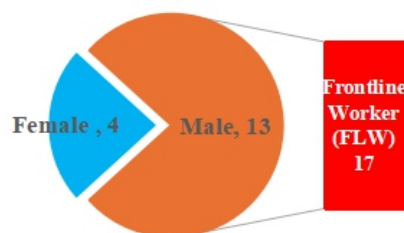
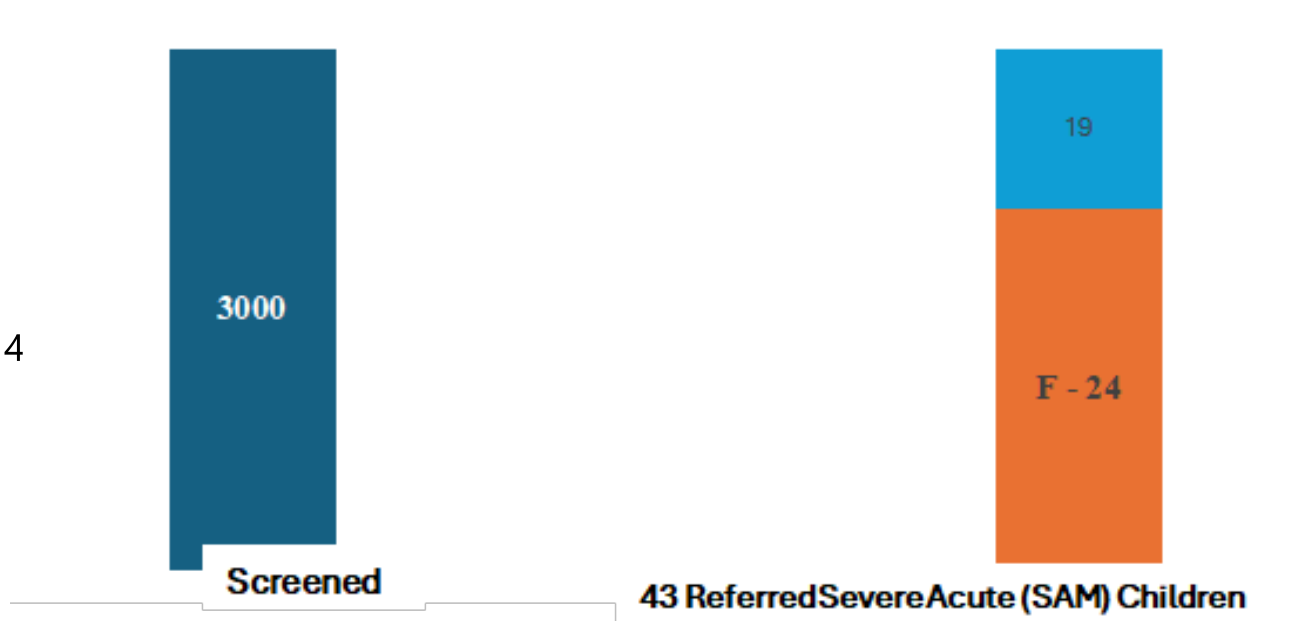

- 2. **Child Screening and Referrals:** Screened 3,000 children for malnutrition, identifying and referring 43 Severe Acute Malnutrition (SAM) cases (24 females and 19 males) for treatment at the designated PHC/OTP facilities.

- 3. **Establishment of Mother-Led IYCF Support Groups:** Established 12 mother-led Infant and Young Child Feeding (IYCF) support groups at the community level to encourage positive nutrition practices for children with SAM and MAM.
- 4. **Supply of Medical Support:** Delivered essential routine drugs, including Vitamin A (100.00IU/200.00IU) and Oral Rehydration Salts (ORS), to identified children and caregivers at the household level, ensuring timely medical support for effective management of malnutrition.

SCEAP Project

The Strengthening Community Engagement and Accountability for Primary Healthcare (SCEAP) project, currently being implemented in the Bade and Nguru Local Government Areas (LGAs) of Yobe State, Nigeria, represents a groundbreaking collaboration between RAWYOD and BudgIT, with funding from the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation. This initiative is designed to enhance primary healthcare delivery through a focus on community-led advocacy, robust monitoring of service delivery, and the efficient allocation of resources for healthcare infrastructure. At the heart of the SCEAP project is the goal of empowering local communities by ensuring their active involvement in advocating for transparency, improved resource allocation, and the strengthening of healthcare facilities. The project prioritizes inclusive participation, particularly from vulnerable and marginalized groups, fostering a system where all voices are heard in shaping the healthcare services they receive. This approach aims to improve access to quality primary healthcare, ensure accountability at local and national levels, and promote the effective use of healthcare resources. Ultimately, the project aspires to establish a transparent, accountable healthcare system that meets the needs of the community, driving meaningful improvements in service quality and ensuring the sustainability of healthcare for all Nigerians

Key Achievements of the SCEAP Project

1. **Enhanced Community Engagement and Ownership:** Community members have increasingly taken ownership of their healthcare, as evidenced by their active participation in town hall meetings. During these sessions, local residents identified key challenges facing health facilities and proactively engaged with stakeholders, including the Local Government Area (LGA) Chairman, to address these concerns. This engagement reflects a growing sense of responsibility and commitment to improving healthcare at the grassroots level.
2. **Increased Health Awareness:** There has been a notable increase in health awareness, particularly among youth, women, and the broader community. Targeted sensitization efforts have enabled individuals to gain a better understanding of essential health issues, including cholera prevention. This newfound knowledge is empowering community members to adopt healthier lifestyles and improve hygiene practices.
3. **Community Ownership of Healthcare:** The sense of community ownership has significantly grown, as demonstrated by actions such as a philanthropist funding the repair of the Afunori facility's solar panel. Additionally, community advocates have actively lobbied for improvements, ensuring their voices are heard and their healthcare needs are addressed by local authorities and service providers.
4. **Collaborative Responsibility:** A spirit of collective responsibility is evident in the community's involvement in maintaining health facilities. For instance, community members at Dagona Primary Health Care Centre (PHCC) have taken it upon themselves to clean the facility monthly, ensuring a hygienic and conducive environment for healthcare delivery. This collaboration extends to regular participation in meetings led by Ward Development Committees (WDC), Facility In-Charges (OICs), and other stakeholders.
5. **Increased Awareness of the Patient Accountability Tracker (PAT) Platform:** The community has gained greater awareness of the Patient Accountability Tracker (PAT) platform and its benefits. Through ongoing sensitization, a growing number of individuals now understand how to use PAT forms, enabling them to better engage with healthcare providers. This increased knowledge has fostered a sense of ownership and involvement in the healthcare process.

6. **Improved Accountability:** Town hall meetings have played a crucial role in promoting accountability within health facilities. Through these gatherings, community members hold service providers accountable for the quality of care delivered. For example, after identifying hygiene challenges at Babuje PHCC during a town hall, the RAWYOD team, in collaboration with community leaders, worked with facility staff to address the issue, leading to significant improvements in hygiene standards.
7. **Positive Change in Healthcare Providers' Attitudes:** Sensitization of healthcare providers has resulted in a positive shift in attitudes toward patient care. Healthcare professionals have become more compassionate, patient-centered, and responsive to the needs of the community, which has led to higher standards of care and improved patient satisfaction.
8. **Improved Healthcare Delivery:** Tangible improvements in healthcare facilities have been realized as a direct result of the project's efforts. For instance, at Hausari PHCC, three new health workers were hired, and a generator room was constructed at Ngilewa PHCC. Additionally, measurements for a new facility gate were taken at Garin Lamido. These developments highlight the direct impact of community participation and advocacy in driving improvements in healthcare delivery.
9. **Strengthened Collaboration Among Stakeholders:** The town hall meetings and Ward Development Committee (WDC) gatherings have fostered stronger collaboration between stakeholders, including community members, local authorities, and healthcare providers. This increased cooperation has enhanced the effectiveness of healthcare delivery and resource allocation, further contributing to the project's success.

INCREASING ACCESS TO NUTRITION SERVICES IN YOBE STATE PROJECT

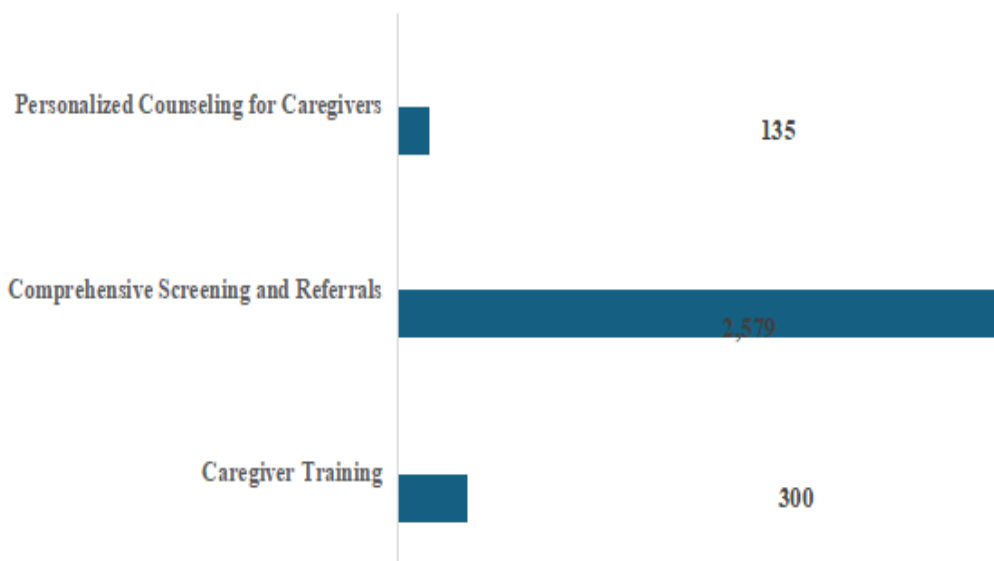
The Increasing Access to Nutrition Services in Yobe State project is dedicated to improving the nutritional well-being and overall health of vulnerable communities through targeted education campaigns and physical assessments. The project primarily focuses on communities most at risk of malnutrition, employing a community-led approach that involves close collaboration with government stakeholders, local leaders, and trained volunteers. This collective effort is aimed at driving sustainable improvements in nutrition and health outcomes. A central element of the initiative is the promotion of positive feeding practices among caregivers of malnourished children. This objective will be achieved through individualized counseling sessions and home visits, equipping caregivers with the knowledge and practical tools needed to adopt healthier feeding habits and support the recovery and growth of children in need.

Key Achievements:

1. **Enhanced Child Health Outcomes:** Significant improvements were observed in the health and nutritional status of children, particularly those benefiting from the Tom Brown nutritional approach, which demonstrated positive results in combating malnutrition.
2. **Establishment of a Community Support Network:** A robust support group was successfully established within the community, providing a sustainable platform for peer education and mutual assistance, ensuring continued support beyond the project's duration.

3. **Increased Community Knowledge:** There was a marked increase in the understanding of nutrition and child health practices among community members, strengthening local capacity for ongoing, sustainable health initiatives.
4. **Caregiver Training:** A total of 300 caregivers were trained on the importance of healthy eating and effective child health management practices, fostering better caregiving and child nutritional support.
5. **Comprehensive Screening and Referrals:** The project screened 2,579 individuals, identifying cases of malnutrition and referring them for appropriate medical and nutritional care, ensuring timely intervention and treatment.
6. **Tom Brown Preparation Training:** Twenty-four caregivers were trained on the preparation and benefits of Tom Brown, equipping them with essential skills to enhance child nutrition through this local, nutritious food option.
7. **Personalized Counseling for Caregivers:** One-on-one counseling sessions were provided to 135 caregivers, offering tailored guidance on nutrition and child health, aimed at promoting healthier feeding practices and improving overall child health outcomes.



WASH INTERVENTION

With the generous financial support from UNICEF through the Yobe Rural Water Supply and Sanitation Agency (RUWASA), RAWYOD has been tasked with the implementation of comprehensive cholera prevention activities in Yobe State. These activities, which are part of the Case-area Targeted Intervention (CATI) strategy, are being executed across three Local Government Areas (LGAs): Fune, Nangere, and Bade. The project focuses on a range of essential cholera prevention measures aimed at curbing the spread of the disease and ensuring access to safe water and sanitation. Key activities being carried out as part of the initiative include the disinfection of households with confirmed cholera cases, neighboring households, and healthcare facilities within the affected communities. This is complemented by the disinfection of sanitation facilities in both private households and public spaces, which helps prevent further contamination.

Additionally, RAWYOD has distributed Aqua Tabs to community members, providing an effective solution to ensure access to safe drinking water. The organization has also undertaken the mapping of local water sources, alongside the chlorination of water points and continuous monitoring of Free Residual Chlorine (FRC) levels to ensure the safety of drinking water. Water quality assessments are regularly conducted to evaluate and maintain the overall safety of water in the targeted areas.

Furthermore, the project has actively engaged with local stakeholders through hygiene promotion activities, emphasizing the importance of good hygiene practices to reduce the risk of cholera. Through these concerted efforts, the project aims to effectively address cholera outbreaks in the targeted LGAs, reduce the spread of the disease, and improve the overall health and well-being of the communities in Yobe State.



Community Engagement during cholera outbreak

2024 RAWYOD KEY ACHIEVEMENTS

Key Project Achievements:

As a result of these efforts, RAWYOD has made significant progress in implementing cholera prevention measures. The following achievements highlight the outcomes of the activities conducted:

- A total of 105 households with cholera cases have been disinfected, alongside surrounding households and affected healthcare facilities.
- 1,002 sanitation facilities across both private and public spaces have been disinfected to reduce the risk of contamination.
- 105 cholera kits have been distributed to support affected individuals and communities.
- The project has successfully reached 19,976 individuals with hygiene promotion activities, encouraging better hygiene practices in the targeted areas.
- A total of 69 water points has been mapped, with 48 of these water points chlorinated to ensure access to safe drinking water.
- 6 cartons of Aqua Tabs have been distributed to community members, further promoting access to clean water.
- Importantly, 1 non-functional water point in Cholera affected community of Bade LGA have been rehabilitated

HPV Vaccine Introduction

The HPV Vaccination Campaign is a strategic collaboration implemented by RAWYOD, in partnership with Direct Consulting Logistics and the Johns Hopkins International Vaccine Access Center (IVAC), with funding generously provided by Gavi. This initiative is being implemented in the Damaturu Local Government Area (LGA), Yobe State, with a primary goal of increasing the uptake of the Human Papillomavirus (HPV) vaccine among girls aged 9 to 14 years. The project is designed to support and strengthen the state's immunization efforts by fostering active engagement with key stakeholders, integrating project activities into the state's existing micro plans, and enhancing local coordination mechanisms.

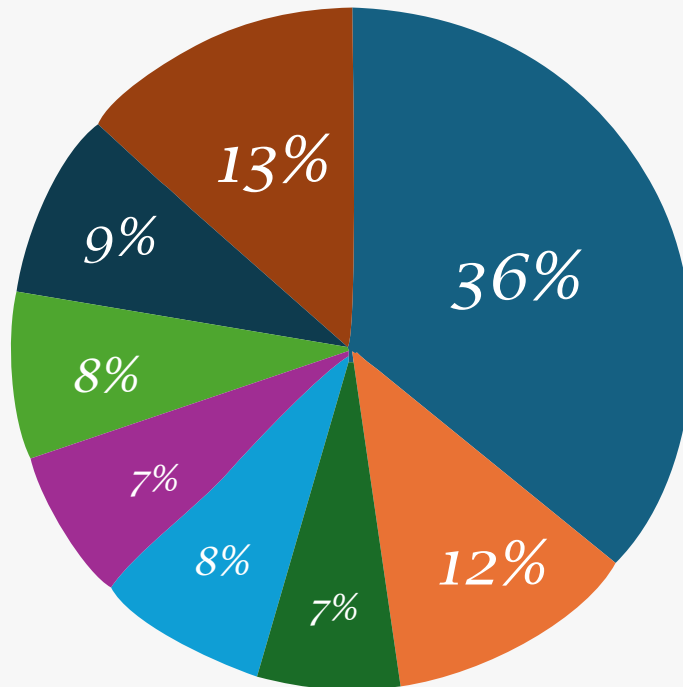
Key Achievements of the Project:

1. The project successfully engaged a diverse range of community stakeholders, including District Heads, Village Heads, Religious Leaders, Youth and Women Leaders, Ward Focal Persons, and relevant Government MDAs.
2. Comprehensive sensitization sessions were conducted, focusing on the dangers of cervical cancer and the vital role of the HPV vaccine in preventing it.
3. Over 54,000 adolescent girls aged 9-14 years were successfully reached and provided with the HPV vaccination, contributing significantly to the state's immunization efforts.
4. Stakeholders were provided with in-depth education on 10 key facts about HPV and Cervical Cancer, resulting in an increase in awareness and understanding of the importance of vaccination.

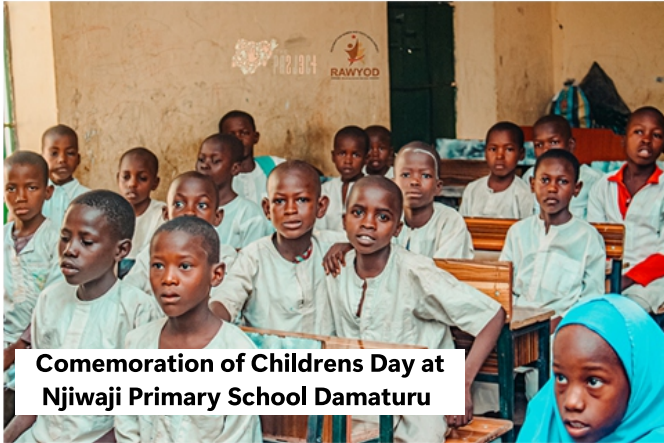
5. Through targeted sensitization campaigns, stakeholders gained improved insights into the prevalent myths and misconceptions surrounding the HPV vaccine, empowering them with accurate information to address these issues within their communities.
6. The project successfully reached 43,578 people with comprehensive HPV sensitization materials, directly engaging 14,739 adolescent girls with key facts about HPV and the benefits of vaccination.

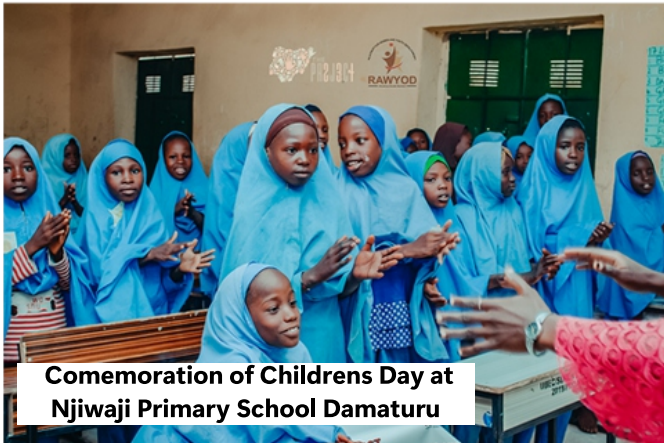
